<p>Comprehension and Phonics The children in Year 2 will take part in a comprehension/phonics-based task every morning. This will either involve the children applying their reading skills to decode passages of writing in order to answer questions based upon the text or will require the children to practise the application of a particular phonetical sound in a range of writing and reading tasks.</p> <p>Key Literacy texts- The invisible thread-Patrise Karste Goldilocks and the Three Bears The Three Little Pigs Little Red Riding Hood</p> <p>Linking to: Reading The children will have 1:1 reading with an adult weekly, alongside their home reading book which will be changed every Friday. They will also have access to the reading area and have daily story reads as a whole class. The children will have extra reading opportunities throughout the week in small groupings with books linked to the topic. They will be encouraged to use phonics to decode regular words and read aloud.</p> <p>Writing: The children will be exposed to a range of texts to explore different styles of writing. This will include writing about their own experiences, sequencing, writing explanations and character descriptions. Whilst doing so, the children will be encouraged to think carefully about their use of fingers spaces, punctuation and of tenses. The children will be prompted to re-read their work at every opportunity, to ensure it makes sense and to edit their work to make necessary improvements. The teachers will also support the children to up level their vocabulary, thinking of ambitious and interesting synonyms for words like big, sad etc.</p> <p>Spellings The children will receive spellings which relate to the sounds explored in daily phonics or based upon year group expectations. To describe and compare the structure of a variety of common animals- fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals including pets. To identify, name, draw and label the basic parts of the human body and say which part of the body is associated with each sense.</p> <p>Working scientifically During years 1 and 2, pupils should be taught to use the following practical scientific methods, processes and skills through the teaching of the programme of study content: -Asking simple questions and recognising that they can be answered in different ways. -Observing closely, using simple equipment. -Performing simple tests. -Identifying and classifying. -Using their observations and ideas to suggest answers to questions. -Gathering and recording data to help in answering questions.</p>
